Month Summary

The portfolio returned -3.6% for the month of January 2010. This outperformed the benchmark S&P/ASX 300 Accumulation Index, which returned -6.2% for the month.

The Australian equity market had its largest monthly fall since the height of the global financial crisis in November 2008. While commentators point to concerns over monetary tightening in China and increasing US banking sector regulatory risk, it should be remembered that markets rallied almost without pause from the March 2009 lows and were very overbought on a medium term basis. CannaE was early but ultimately correct in anticipating that the market's infatuation with "high beta" stocks would not continue without interruption.

Energy and Materials were the two weakest sectors as speculators responded to reports that China will slow its economy more than

expected to control increasing inflation. Consumer Staples lagged on concerns over lower price inflation impacting sales and increasing rivalry among the two major competitors. Some sectors perceived as defensive outperformed, including IT, REITs and Telecommunications.

Portfolio Activity

There was minimal portfolio activity during the month.

Stock Performance

The top performers for the month were Regional Express (+9.6%) after being awarded the Victorian air ambulance tender and winning regional airline of the year from Air Transport World, and Ramsay Healthcare (+5.3%) after announcing an acquisition that will expand its operations into the lucrative continental European

market. STW Communications (+4.0%) belatedly rose after announcing several major new account wins over the previous three months.

The bottom performers for the month were BHP Billiton (-8.6%) as commodity prices fell in anticipation that the Chinese government will act to counter rising inflation risks and as the US dollar rose, Lend Lease (-8.1%) on concerns over its credit rating in the wake of several major project wins, and Woolworths (-7.6%) following a weaker than expected 2Q10 sales result driven by lower food inflation. BHP and Woolworths are both underweight positions.
